Christopher Coons (D)

1. What sets you apart from your opponents?

Our country is

facing three big challenges – the CO-VID-19 pandemic, the resulting economic crisis, and the need to address racial injustice in our society. I am running for re-election be-

cause I want to continue the work already started to address each of these challenges. I have a science background and worked in the private sector for a growing, international materials-based science company. I also have years of experience in county government and the Senate. I understand the challenges families, businesses, and our state and local governments are facing. I also have a strong track record of working across party lines and with people I disagree with to find solutions and pass legislation.

2. In the Primary Issues and Answers section you listed the following as your top three priorities if you are re-elected: Protecting and expanding the Affordable Care Act and lowering the cost of prescription drugs; Rebuilding our economy and ensuring Americans can work and support themselves and their families; Taking action to address climate change. How do you plan to accomplish these goals?

John Carney (D)
